DAY 01 Chiang Mai Arrival / (Hotel)

Once you have checked in, the remainder of the day is at your leisure, allowing you to relax and enjoy your stay in Chiang Mai and take this opportunity to explore the city at your own pace.

DAY 02

Chiang Mai Sightseeing: Ping River Cruise / Wat Phra Singh Temple / Wat Chiang Man Temple / Wat Lok Moli Temple / Wat Chedi Luang Temple (Hotel / Breakfast / Lunch)

Breakfast at the hotel.

08:30 AM Pick up from the hotel

Depart from your hotel to the jetty, where a wonderful cruise along the Ping River awaits you. The Ping River has been a lifeline for Chiang Mai since ancient times, providing sustenance and nourishment to the land and its people. The cruise offers panoramic views of both sides of the river, allowing you to immerse yourself in the tranquil beauty of the surrounding landscape. You witness the daily life of the Riverside community, observing villagers engaged in various activities that revolve around their dependence on the river for their livelihoods. Your first stop is at "Baan Chao Na," where you experience the charming atmosphere of ancient riverside houses. These houses showcase the traditional way of life of farmers and the Riverside community, giving you a glimpse into the rich cultural heritage of the region. As you explore further, you come across local vegetable and herb plots, farming equipment, rice milling processes, and vegetable cultivation practices free from harmful chemicals. This insight into traditional agricultural practices allows you to appreciate the sustainable methods employed by the locals to cultivate their crops.

Lunch at the restaurant.

Explore Chiang Mai City and delve into its history by visiting its ancient temples, starting with Wat Phra Singh. Located in the heart of Chiang Mai, Wat Phra Singh is a cornerstone of Northern Thailand's cultural and spiritual heritage. Established in the 14th century during the reign of King Pha Yu of the Mengrai Dynasty, this temple epitomizes Lanna-style architecture with its intricate wooden carvings, gilded ornamentation, and a harmonious blend of local and Burmese influences. The temple's focal point is the Viharn Luang, an assembly hall enshrining the revered Phra Singh Buddha image. This hall showcases exquisite Lanna craftsmanship, with

intricate murals depicting spiritual stories. Another highlight is the resplendent pagoda, notable for its octagonal base and multi-tiered design. The library (Ho Trai), a sacred repository for Buddhist scriptures, stands out with its ornate carvings and distinctive style. Wat Phra Singh remains an active monastery, home to monks devoted to spiritual practices. Its central location makes it a popular destination for both local worshippers and visitors seeking to experience Chiang Mai's heritage. Beyond its religious significance, the temple serves as a cultural hub, hosting events like Songkran (Thai New Year), religious processions, and the traditional "wian tian" candle-lighting ceremony.

Continue your visit to Wat Chiang Man Temple, nestled in the heart of Chiang Mai. As the city's oldest temple, it is steeped in history and reverence. Built in 1296 by Phaya Mangrai, the first king of the Lanna Kingdom, the temple originated as part of the Chiang Man Palace, constructed during Chiang Mai's founding. The temple houses the sacred Phra Setangkhamanee (Phra Kaew Khao), a revered Buddha image symbolizing faith and devotion among locals. It also safeguards historical artifacts, including the Wat Chiang Man stone inscription, which chronicles the city's establishment and the temple's creation. Architecturally, the temple features the impressive Chang Lom Pagoda, blending Lanna and Sukhothai styles, with a square base adorned by 16 stucco elephants and a golden bell-shaped top. Nearby, the Wihan Luang, a modern structure, showcases a striking golden mural narrating Chiang Mai's origins and Phaya Mangrai's legacy. Adjacent to it is the original Wihan, home to the sacred Phra Setangkhamanee. Wat Chiang Man is a living testament to Chiang Mai's rich history, preserving the legacy of its founder and the Lanna Kingdom through its sacred relics, inscriptions, and timeless architecture. It remains a profound symbol of cultural and spiritual heritage.

After exploring Wat Chiang Man, continue your journey to Wat Lok Moli, an ancient temple just outside the Chiang Mai moat. Dating back to the 14th century during the reign of King Kuena (1355–1385), this temple holds a special place in Lanna history. King Kuena, a patron of Buddhism and the arts, invited ten Burmese monks in 1367 to spread Theravada Buddhism, establishing Wat Lok Moli as a hub of religious learning. The temple also served as a royal burial site, housing the ashes of several Lanna rulers, including Queen Wisutthithewi. Known for her resilience and leadership, she defended the Lanna Kingdom, fostered diplomacy, and supported the arts, leaving a legacy enshrined in the temple's chedi. Wat Lok Moli exemplifies Lanna architecture, with its towering chedi built in 1527. The chedi's octagonal base, housing Buddha images, rises 25 meters high, and its exposed brickwork exudes rustic charm. Intricately carved naga sculptures adorn the staircases, symbolizing protection and wisdom. The temple's viharn (assembly hall) and ubosot (ordination hall) showcase ornate wood carvings, gilded details, and multi-tiered roofs with naga motifs. Commissioned by King Ket in 1545, the viharn features a large seated Buddha, while the ubosot, built in 1801, contains smaller Buddha images. Wat Lok Moli is more than a temple; it's a vivid link to the Lanna Kingdom's history, culture, and artistry. With its distinctive architecture and deep historical ties, it offers visitors a glimpse into the enduring legacy of Chiang Mai's ancient past.

As dusk approaches, continue your journey to Wat Chedi Luang, a grand temple that still exudes historical significance. The imposing Chedi Luang pagoda, a testament to the Lanna architectural style, remains unfinished at the top due to a devastating earthquake. Despite its partial ruin, the structure stands as a symbol of resilience and

the enduring strength of the Lanna dynasty's architectural prowess. Explore the temple grounds and imagine the bustling monastic life that once thrived here. The serene environment provides a perfect backdrop for meditation and reflection. Learn about the reign of King Prachao Sanmuangma, the seventh king of the Mongrai dynasty, who initiated the temple's construction in the 14th century. The temple's rich history is filled with tales of devotion and artistry, with each corner revealing a piece of the past. The temple grounds house various structures, including assembly halls and prayer rooms, each adorned with intricate details and carvings that tell stories of the region's heritage. End your day with another relaxing night in charming Chiang Mai. Reflect on the experiences of the day's travels, the spiritual serenity of the temples you visited, and the historical atmosphere of Chiang Mai, all of which will lull you to a blissful sleep.

DAY 03

Chiang Mai - Mae Hong Son: Doi Inthanon National Park / Grand Pagodas / The Royal Agricultural Station Inthanon / Wachiratharn Waterfall (Hotel / Breakfast / Lunch)

This station not only conducts essential research on various agricultural aspects, including flowers, ornamental plants, vegetables, fruits, and highland fisheries but also focuses on sharing research findings to promote sustainable development, social progress, and forest watershed conservation. The project plays a crucial role in supporting hill tribe farmers' families in the neighboring villages by generating income and fostering community development.

Discover the magnificent allure of Wachirathan Waterfall, an impressive natural wonder that stands tall and majestic as one of Thailand's most beautiful waterfalls, gracing the landscape with its year-round flowing waters. With its towering height reaching an impressive 70 meters, this single-tiered cascade captivates all who lay eyes upon it. The waterfall's charm is further enhanced during the rainy season when sun-kissed water droplets scatter through the air, giving rise to enchanting rainbows that adorn the surroundings of Wachirathan Waterfall. Similarly, Phra Mahathat Naphaphonphumisiri was constructed as an offering to Her Majesty Queen Sirikit during the celebrations of Her Majesty the Queen's 5th cycle birthday in 1992. The pagodas are surrounded by enchanting winter flower gardens and a diverse array of plants. The area's cool climate offers a refreshing ambiance throughout the year, and the panoramic views from this vantage point are considered among the most splendid in Chiang Mai.

Venture to Doi Inthanon, Thailand's highest peak towering at an impressive altitude of 2,565 meters above sea level. This majestic mountain is part of the vast Thanon Thongchai Mountain range, which stretches across multiple countries, including Nepal, Bhutan, and Myanmar. The mountain boasts a rich variety of climates and forests, with opportunities to experience rainforests, pine forests, and mixed forests at different elevations. At the summit, visitors will be rewarded with breathtaking panoramic vistas. Nearby, don't miss the Yun Lai viewpoint, a breathtaking spot that provides panoramic views of Pai city enveloped by lush paddy fields and rugged mountain ranges. The sight of a sea of mist blanketing the area during both winter and the rainy season is truly enchanting. Be sure to catch the spectacular sunrise at the viewpoint, an awe-inspiring moment that will etch a lasting memory in your heart.

DAY 07

Pai – Ban Tha Ton Village: Pong Dued Hot Spring / Mork Fah Waterfall / Wat Ban Den Temple / Hinoki Land / Ban Tha Ton (Hotel / Breakfast / Lunch)

Embark on a mesmerizing journey from Pai to Mae Taeng District, where a plethora of natural wonders, cultural delights, and architectural marvels await. First, visit the Pong Dueat Hot Springs, a grand geyser-like hot spring with steam rising regularly. This underground hot spring boasts a temperature between 170-200 degrees Celsius, while the surface water hovers around 90-100 degrees Celsius, emitting a constant aroma of sulfur. Surrounding the hot springs is a lush jungle, offering a nature study route spanning approximately 1.5 km. This scenic path leads you through towering trees, ferns, and moss, presenting a captivating journey that forms a circular loop and crosses a long bridge. Along the way, informative signboards share insights about Pong Dueat Hot Springs and the plants you encounter, adding to the enriching experience.

Next, venture to Mork Fah Waterfall, nestled within the enchanting Doi Suthep-Pui National Park. Mork Fah Waterfall is a serene destination that captivates visitors

year-round. Though modest in size compared to other waterfalls, its charm lies in the consistent flow of water that cascades gracefully through the lush forest. Streams originating deep within the dense jungle converge to form two branches, which tumble over rocky cliffs below. The surrounding environment is a verdant paradise, with towering trees and plants covered in moss and ferns, creating an atmosphere of tranquility and natural beauty. When sunlight filters through the foliage, it dances across the cascading waters, creating shimmering rainbows that lend a magical quality to the scene. Each season brings its own unique allure: in autumn, the crisp air enhances the peaceful ambiance, while the rainy season amplifies the waterfall's power, transforming it into a breathtaking spectacle of force and grandeur.

After soaking in the beauty of Mork Fah Waterfall, continue your journey by visiting the awe-inspiring Wat Ban Den Temple, also known as Wat Den Sari Sri Muang Kaen. Located in the Inthakin Sub-District, this temple holds historical and cultural significance. The name "Wat Den Sari Sri Muang Kaen" is derived from the sacred "Sari Tree," or Bodhi tree, that grows within its grounds. Spanning an impressive 83-rai area, Hinoki Land is the country's first and only hinoki wood kingdom, designed to transport visitors into a captivating Japanese atmosphere. At the entrance, a grand red lantern arch welcomes visitors, symbolizing good luck and prosperity. A tunnel of 88 pairs of torii gates guides guests toward the centerpiece of the attraction: the majestic Hinoki Castle. Inspired by Kyoto's iconic Kinkakuji Castle, this stunning structure is a testament to the intricate craftsmanship and attention to detail that defines Japanese architecture. Begin your visit at the Roi Jai Rak Project, a thoughtful initiative managed by the Mae Fah Luang Foundation under the Royal Patronage of His Majesty the King. The project's main goal is to enhance the quality of life for the local hill tribe communities by creating employment opportunities and generating income. The project encompasses Suan Roi Jai Rak, a delightful garden plantation showcasing a variety of winter flowers and vegetables for visitors to admire. Additionally, explore Kad Luang Roi Jai Rak, a market where villagers present high-quality produce, including fresh vegetables, fruits, and flowers, along with intricate handicrafts for tourists to peruse and purchase.

Next, immerse yourself in the fascinating culture, traditions, and lifestyle of the Akha hill tribe. Originally from southern China, the Akha people have migrated and established villages in the north of Myanmar and, eventually, settled in the north of Thailand over the past century. These vibrant communities prefer high-altitude living, typically residing at around 1,000 meters above sea level. Most Akha houses are built on the ground, featuring thatched roofs and bamboo walls, often situated on flat areas along mountain ridges. Agriculture, including crop cultivation and livestock rearing, forms the backbone of their economy. Household industries such as sewing, embroidery, and silverware crafting also contribute to their livelihood. Admire the Akha women's colorful dresses adorned with eye-catching silverware and multicolored beads, a tribal attire as captivating as that of other northern Thai tribes.

Lunch at the restaurant.

Venture to Doi Mae Salong, renowned for cultivating excellent tea and surrounded by breathtaking beauty. Green terraced tea plantations spread across the area, offering a serene and tranquil atmosphere for visitors to enjoy. Doi Mae Salong is a Chinese Yunnan village, whose residents immigrated to Thailand decades ago due to political changes in China. Scattered settlements emerged in northern Thailand in 1961, and the Thai government officially welcomed Chinese immigrants to settle in Thailand in 1972. Agriculture, particularly tea and various fruits and vegetables, became their primary occupation. Apart from the scenic terraced tea plantations and mountain vistas, the village exudes an ambiance reminiscent of a Chinese village in southern China.

Continue your journey to Chiang Rai to visit the impressive Wat Huay Pla Kang Temple. Perched atop a small hill, the temple boasts stunning views of its surroundings. Notably, the temple's 9-storey, 12-sided chedi captivates with its unique shape adorned with intricate Chinese and Lanna arts. The chedi's red roof is flanked by two majestic dragon statues, leading visitors up the stairs to its peak. Inside the chedi, an exquisite large sandalwood statue of the Goddess Guan Yin Bodhisattva graces the space. The temple also features a 69-meter-tall statue of Guan Yin Bodhisattva, nearly the height of a 25-storey building, with an elevator system

providing easy access for tourists to enjoy breathtaking views of Chiang Rai. As the day comes to an end, find comfort and rest in Chiang Rai, reflecting on the captivating experiences of the journey and the beauty of the destinations explored.
